Laura Mohlenhoff

Laura Mohlenhoff remembers that at 4 years old she was just the right size to crawl inside a commercial dishwasher to retrieve a bolt that had rattled loose. Her mother owned A.G. Maas Co., a janitorial supply company established in 1915 in Indianapolis, and they often made after-hours service calls together.

Laura’s grandfather bought the near south-side company in 1962. He sold it to Laura’s mother 20 years later, and Laura bought it in 2006. The company provides maintenance products and supplies for many downtown businesses.

With just three full-time employees and “Flip,” the office “schnoodle” (schnauzer-poodle cross), the company is on pace for a second-straight record sales year, doing things the old-fashioned way – with chairs set out for visiting with customers and neighbors, with the owner’s personal attention to detail, and a deep conviction to community service.

What Rotary gives Laura: “It’s the whole package – physical, mental, service, time, and a place to donate money for good causes – Rotary is far-reaching. It also helps me make business contacts.”

“When my grandfather, John Lytle, bought the business, he had recently recovered from a case of polio but had lost a lot of use in his legs. It was difficult for him to get up and down stairs to see clients. But he never complained. That never affected him. He is an inspiration. He still comes in to chat about business. When I found out about the Rotary International’s programs to eradicate polio, that really appealed to me.”

What she gives Rotary: “I really felt selfish to not be a part of something like Rotary.

I was born and raised in Indianapolis. I love the city, the history and culture. So, here I am now, the History Committee Chairman of the Indianapolis Rotary Club.”

Laura also serves on the Membership Committee and has been a “Raffle for Riley” ambassador. She also is the secretary of the Concord Business Association (a group of about 50 businesses in her neighborhood), a member of the National Association of Women Business Owners, and silent auction chairman of the International Violin Competition of Indianapolis. She has also been a volunteer judge for the Marion County Spelling Bee.

“I don’t like that ‘I’m too busy’ excuse,” Laura says with a smile.

Through a Rotary friendship with FBI retiree Bill Ervin, Laura also has participated in the FBI Citizens Academy, where she has seen firsthand “straight from the FBI agents what they are doing in our community and around our country.”

It was a Rotary friendship with Mary Jane Sorbera that got her into the international violin competition. “If Mary Jane hadn’t asked if I had time – and of course, I didn’t – I would never have had that great experience. I said, ‘Sign me up anyway.’”

Through the years, Laura has learned dozens of important values, not the least of which is community service and outreach and the power it possesses. “I have found that the busier I am, the more I accomplish, and the happier I am. I am very selective about what I want to be a part of, because time is limited. That’s why I love Rotary. Whenever I leave a Rotary meeting, I feel energized. It’s an important outlet for me.”

Indiana Court of Appeals

Oral Argument

In 1994, Mercho-Roushdi-Shoemaker-Dilley Thoraco-Vascular Corporation (MRSD), which is based in Indianapolis but has expanded to Terre Haute, hired Dr. James Blatchford III (Blatchford) and Dr. Eve Cieutat (Cieutat), husband and wife, to provide surgical services in Terre Haute. In early 1999, Blatchford and Cieutat signed agreements that made them partners in MRSD. Those agreements contained a non-competition clause providing that, if they ever left MRSD, Blatchford and Cieutat would not be allowed, for a period of three years, to provide thoracic, vascular, or cardiovascular services within a fifty-mile radius of “the center of the Court House of Terre Haute” or within a fifty-mile radius of “the center of Monument Circle in Indianapolis.” In late 1999, the relationship between the parties deteriorated. Blatchford was fired, Cieutat resigned, and the two of them continued to practice in Terre Haute as Cardiothoracic Surgical Associates of Wabash Valley. On December 2, 1999, Blatchford and Cieutat filed a lawsuit against MRSD, and MRSD filed a counterclaim, alleging that Blatchford and Cieutat were practicing in violation of the non-competition clause. On January 4, 2008, after more than eight years of litigation that included a prior appeal to the Indiana Court of Appeals, the trial court granted summary judgment in favor of Blatchford and Cieutat with regard to MRSD’s claim that they had violated the non-competition clause. There is no dispute that Blatchford and Cieutat practiced in violation of the terms of the non-competition clause. However, the trial court concluded that the terms of the clause were unreasonably restrictive and that, therefore, the clause was unenforceable. MRSD now appeals the trial court’s decision.

Flight Surgeon, Normandy Invasion

Paul Muller was born and raised in Lawrenceburg, Indiana and graduated from Lawrenceburg High School. He graduated from Notre Dame and attended St. Louis University School of Medicine. He later attended Cornell University where he finished his education and became a licensed OBGYN.

Dr. Muller entered the service in 1941 with completion of his internship and ROTC requirements. He was trained at Flight Surgeon’s school in Tampa, and was then sent to San Antonio and Fort Leavenworth for advanced training.

Dr. Muller arrived at Normandy shortly after the invasion.

Indiana Toll Road
